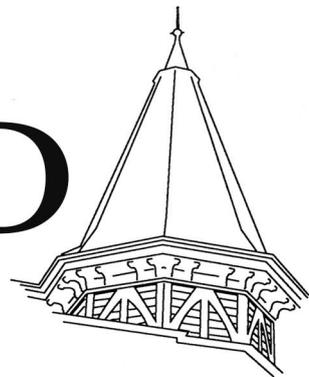

VIVE LE REPAIR RÉVOLUTION!

The Christchurch Repair Revolution is a new monthly event run by volunteers, aiming to change our relationships with the things we own. To reduce waste, we need to reject the notion of a ‘throwaway society’ and fix our cycle of buy-break-chuck. The Repair Revolution follows the model of a repair cafe where skilled and amateur repairers come together to help fix people’s things - as well as teaching them how to repair and maintain them!

The Richmond Community Garden hosted the third monthly event on October 16th at the Riverlution

Eco Hub on Vogel St. We had an amazing turnout of volunteers and guests, and successfully repaired a huge number of things from clothes and sleeping bags, to kids’ toys, coffee machines, vacuum cleaners and much more.


Remembering Stanmore

I grew up, sixty odd years ago [1940s], at 267 Stanmore Road. Morgan Davies' shoe repair shop was on the corner of Bruce Street. [This street was already closed by 2003, but once connected Stanmore Rd and Pavitt St, by St Vincent de Paul's]. There were only 3 homes in Bruce Street: the Ward family (he was a detective), the O'Hagans (he sang in the Cathedral choir) and the Keatleys. Also in the street was Stokes' Bakery, where we spent hours hitting a tennis ball against the brick wall. Opposite, Ron Challis started up what is now Butler's Auto, at the time just the size of an average household garage. Further down was Hamilton's - the milkman. I remember helping to fill the bottles out of what to me looked like an upturned milk churn. On the other corner of Alexandra Street, was McGrath's the blacksmith - to this day I swear that it was haunted.

The house on the opposite side of Vogel Street belonged to Mr and Mrs Ball and I see the house still stands. Next to them was Donaldson's Grocery, and I think the Donaldson's lived in the house next door, north of the shop. The block of shops contained Hillary Parker's bike shop. Everything I know about bikes was shown to me by Hillary. His parents resided at the back of the shop. Then there was the dairy, later run by Sam La Hood (who died recently [in 2003] in his nineties). A popular cake kitchen was next door (Mr Frew?), and Edna Bainbridge

a wrought iron fence in front. I remember McPherson's butchery on North Avon Road, Wonnacott's Fruit Shop on the corner, the drapery, Four Square Grocer, Morgan's hairdressers, Roy Burns which became Richmond Electrical. Opposite was the Self Help Grocery, (now Henry Africa's [now part of the Richmond Club]) where I once worked before I left the district. Bert Hicks was the manager and a very nice man to work for. Next was the Post Office and then a book shop. At church, I used to go to a club called Lifeboys - a maritime version of cubs. The house in the park, on the corner of Pavitt Street, used to house the caretaker of Richmond School. We would spend hours in the park every night after school (after doing our homework, of course). We would be there until dark, sometimes 20-30 kids, male and female, playing bar-the-door! We didn't need any sophisticated playground equipment. Next to the park was the pool and Scout Den, which are no longer there. Nearby, Willie Young ran a fruit and vege shop, and would sell alcohol on a Sunday when it was still illegal. Frank and Mary Greenbank lived behind us and the Legion of Frontiersmen had their meeting place out front. Next door, Stan Barclay turned out thousands of wooden table and chair legs on his lathe. Well I am back home again after that stroll down memory lane. I am sure there is somebody out there who remembers more.



had a hairdresser's which I see is still a salon. A few doors along was McDonald's Tailoring, Syd Hadley was working there when I was a lad. It was recently demolished to make way for housing. Mr Harrison on the corner of Warwick Street used to mow the grass on the park - apparently he lost a few fingers in the process. On the other corner of Warwick Street (now the New World Supermarket), lived the Grahams, who I will never forget, as they treated me as one of their own. They were also caretakers of the swimming pool.

Next was Grainger's Grain and Produce, and then came the Boy's Home, which in those days was run by a Mr Keane - a very fine gentleman. Further down, in Siddal Place, was the Mayor's residence. It used to have

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Mind Yer Language: Wood Luck?

Have you ever touched or knocked on wood to keep a good luck streak going? Ever wondered why? In many European cultures trees were thought to be the homes of supernatural beings such as fairies and sprites. If you were near a special tree you might signal your presence to prevent any mischief occurring, or perhaps ask for its magic to protect you. In Spain it's 'tocar madera' and in France, 'toucher du bois'. In Denmark they say the magic numbers 'syv, ne, tretten' (7, 9, 13), before knocking under a table.

In Latin America knocking on wood is also common, but often with the proviso that the wood doesn't have legs 'tocar madera *sin patas*' i.e. no tables, chairs, etc. Romania has a similar caveat regarding wooden tables. Perhaps so as not to be confused with a monastic practise of knocking on a large, not untable-like wooden instrument (simantra), to call people to prayer. Or maybe just because you can't cheat and fairies don't live in tables. In Bulgaria the table-exclusion can sometimes apply too, but a 'God guard us' and an ear-lobe tug are added. Same for Turkey. In Portugal (and Brazil) there's no need to say anything, three quick knocks will do the trick, though in the absence of a nearby tree saying 'bater na madeira' (hit the wood) might just do.



Druids felt trees held the mysteries of life, the embodiment of Nature's secrets. Their name is believed to come from a combination of the Celtic words for 'oak' (which also meant 'true'): *derwos*, and 'knowledge': *wid*, making them 'they who know the oak/truth'. Incidentally Anglo-Saxons similarly used the same word for 'tree' and 'truth': *treow*. Both the Celtic and Old English came from a literal root word meaning 'steadfast'. Like a tree. Give one a hug today.





This month we sadly farewelled William (Bill) Willmott, husband of Di Madgin, former residents of 373 River Road. After being displaced by the earthquakes Di and Bill fought hard for the community they had to leave, ensuring significant trees were retained, people were supported, and the heritage and history of the area was not lost.

Once the house was gone, they continued coming back to tend their beautiful garden. Today it has become a place of solitude and sometimes celebration, with the odd wedding being held there. Two of our local organisations, Richmond Community Garden and Avon-Otakaro Network assist Di in maintaining her and Bill's treasured piece of River Rd. It serves now as a reminder and symbol of the well-loved homes that once stood, and it will be part of the river's Heritage Trail.

Bill was a professor in sociology at the University of Canterbury, and will be remembered as an excellent teacher; a true leader with a legendary reputation for thinking outside the box. We all thank you Bill, for the loving part you have played in our local history. Our heartfelt condolences to Di, and to all whose lives you touched.
