I Like Birds But...

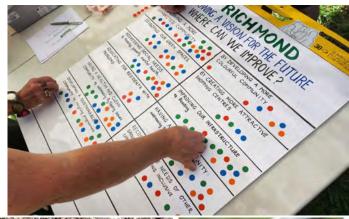
WE ARE RICHMOND

If you attended the recent Nau Mai event at 10 Shirley Road, or the Richmond Gala, you may have noticed We Are Richmond (RRBA), had a sticker survey asking where you'd like us to direct our future attention. If you participated by placing your five dots on the board we thank you! There were eleven fields to choose from and we hope to give you a full report on the responses in April's Community News.

In this issue I would like to focus on something which has caused a few headaches for a small section of our community. This fits under the category of "Advocating for Residents with Problems". For some years now, the residents of Dudley Street have been plagued by a large flock of starlings who each year return to their nesting grounds in the large trees, from October to April. They bring with them the wondrous sight of the murmuration as they all fly in large sweeping arcs through the sky; and the joyous sound of bird song. But there is a less desirable aspect to their presence: the huge accumulation of bird droppings (guano) and its accompanying stench.

Residents have developed almost daily routines to combat the effects of guano on their houses, cars, fences and gardens, such as regular wash-downs of paintwork, etc.; and they have had to adopt some life-changing strategies to protect themselves from the overhead bombardment. Do you carry an umbrella when you take the dog out or go to collect the mail? Most of us enjoy letting our children play on the back lawn without wondering whether they are going to pick up some serious illness; and most of us do not have the embarrassment of being told by friends, "I'm not parking in your street anymore, my car was a mess last time I stopped there!"

The RRBA took up the cudgels on behalf of these residents and took the case to the Papanui Community Board in a 13-page, researched submission. Subsequently, cleaning services in Dudley Street were increased but the birds will return again next October. It's a unique problem and we've had to look overseas for solutions.







Council has begun to realise how serious the problem is and are asking: how can we discourage the birds from nesting there? 'Let us know if you have any ideas!

know when you book, and I can bring one for an extra \$4. It will be a lot of fun!

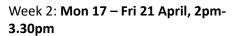

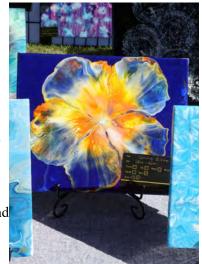
and community board members came to visit on the day too.

Steadfast Correction

I must give my apologies for a misleading statement on the front page of last month's RCN, noted by one of our knowledgeable history volunteers, and perhaps some of you too! I implied that Dr Gundry had arrived in 'Bingsland' in 1851, when in fact Mr Bing himself

wouldn't arrive for another 9 years, and the first recorded use of 'Bingsland' was not until 1869 - long after Dr Gundry had returned to England. The name 'Richmond' didn't become official til the 1880s.

While it's hard to imagine now, when Dr Gundry arrived in Christchurch, everything outside the 'four avenues' was completely it still marshes and wetlands.

Christchurch as a settlement was in its infancy. As Gundry recorded in his diary:

"Of Christchurch itself I can say little. It appears one expansive common with a house here and there - truly I may say it is without form or comeliness."

His wife didn't seem much taken with the place either. "My darling very hysterical after our return on board, but whether from disappointment at Lyttelton, or fearfulness during our trip across to Lyttelton and back, I cannot say." Life as a colonist wasn't easy, and it wasn't for everyone.

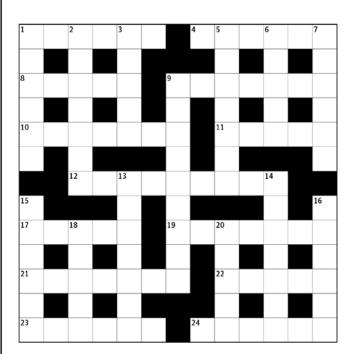

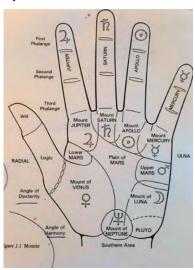
